

"THIS is me with Paul and Linda McCartney during the heyday of Wings. I can't tell you what the occasion

was but it's like that when you're making records – a lot of time you're so busy that you don't remember what happened the day before.

Those were good times though, and when I look at pictures like this today, I appreciate our success much more than I did back then.

When I first met the Beatles I was in a band called Denny Laine and the Diplomats. We were all touring on the same circuit and one night we were playing at this theatre in Birmingham. There was a revolving stage, and as we came off the Beatles walked on to the other side to sing Love Me Do. But someone had forgotten to unplug the speaker leads, so they flew out when the stage swung round and the Beatles' microphones didn't work. It didn't matter though - you wouldn't have heard them anyway because the girls were screaming so loudly.

When I joined The Moody Blues in about 1965, we were signed to the same agency as the Beatles, so we stayed in touch. It was as a result of being their friend over the years that Paul approached me to join Wings, after the Beatles broke up. I think he wanted someone he knew, rather than someone who might be hard to work with.

Wings ran for 10 years but don't be mistaken – it wasn't all sex, drugs and rock'n'roll. Paul and Linda were renovating an old farmhouse in



Scotland, so we went there to rehearse and write every year. I slept in the garage the first night. We would mess around up there and have a laugh while Linda did the cooking.

It was a very casual way of putting a band together. Paul and I would jam and write lyrics, and we were more like old friends hanging out. I never had any problems with Paul because I could adapt to what he was trying to achieve. We never had to talk much about anything

because we already knew each other very well.

Paul and I went through a lot together and we still run into each other now and again. We will always be friends but when people talk about a Wings reunion I don't see the point of it. Wings was just as much about Linda as anyone else. These days when I perform I play a few Wings songs as a tribute but I don't live in the past. I'm the kind of person who prefers to keep moving forward.

Since I left Wings I've been establishing myself as a solo songwriter and performer. I've been playing in Las Vegas and I've released a solo album, *Valley of Dreams*. It's the story of an Englishman coming to America and being influenced by all the different, amazing styles of music."
